Race & Ethnicity (based on total population count) Percentage of Population Latino





Race & Ethnicity (based on total population count)


Percentage of Population Latino

The percentage of the total population who self-identify as one of seven racial categories - mono-racially (only) white, mono-racially black, mono-racially American Indian or Alaska Native, monoracially Asian, mono-racially Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander, monoracially some other race, bi- or multiracial, or as ethnically Latino. In 1990, Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are counted as Asian and bi- and multiracial individuals are not counted separately from mono-racial individuals. Formula example: ([# mono-racially white, non-latino people]/[total population])*100 Source: US Census Bureau, Decennial Census.







Business Ownership

- Latino-owned businesses
 represented 4.6% of all
 firms in 2012, up from 2% in
 2002
- # of Latino-owned businesses increased 144%, 2002-2012
 - 6,300 to 15,500
 - Responsible for 23% of overall business growth in state during period


